## **Part 2: Description**

**Outline syllabus:** This module will look at a range of interlinked radical challenges to the post Second World War order in the 1960s, from the cosmic utopianism of the Soviet project to the student protests of 1968. We will look at the civil rights

movement, decolonisation and anti-imperialism, the rise of environmentalism and the sexual revolution. Emphasis will be on the visual and textual products of these movements, so students will engage directly with ideas through primary sources.

## Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

**Teaching and learning methods:** Teaching and learning methods

The module will be delivered through a mix of contextualising lectures, and studentled seminars with researched, selected or supplied readings of primary and
secondary sources, both textual and visual.

#### Scheduled learning

Includes lectures and seminars. Study time for the module is composed of 36 hours of contact.

### Independent learning

In a normal week students can expect to spend on average three hours engaged in essential reading. One hour should be spent in organising/reviewing material to enable effective seminar engagement. Three further hours should be spent in wider reading/assignment preparation. Independent learning time for the module is composed of 7 hours per week.

#### Further reading

Students will be supplied with detailed reading lists for each topic studied via Blackboard. In addition, students are expected to identify wider reading using the library catalogue and a variety of bibliographic and full text databases and internet resources, particularly in preparation for the submission of coursework assignments.

## Part 4: Assessment

**Assessment strategy:** The assessment of this module consists of three pieces of work:

Assessment A (50% of assessment): A document analysis of a key text from the period. 1,500 words.

Assessment B (50% of total assessment): Visual analysis of a photograph/image from the period. 1, 500 words

Assessment A tests the candidate's ability to construct an argument and engage directly with primary sources and with the relevant historiography.

Assessment B tests students' abilities in terms of primary and secondary research

and the communication of their research in visual forms.

The assessment strategy is designed to measure:

critical engagement with concepts and topics relating to global history in the 1960s (A, B)

the ability to work independently, with self-discipline and effective time management to complete a range of tasks (A, B)

the ability to understand and critically assess relevant secondary literature (A, B) the ability to communicate ideas clearly and succinctly to a non-specialist audience in visual form (B)

the ability to select and develop appropriate supporting materials (B) the capacity to employ analytical and problem-solving abilities (A, B) the ability to formulate and justify their own arguments and conclusions about a range of issues (A)
