Part 2: Description
<p><b>Educational Aims:</b> See Learning Outcomes</p> <p><b>Outline Syllabus:</b> This module will focus on genre fiction. The module will explore what we mean by genre, how genres have evolved, and how different genres sit within the publishing market today. The module will focus on one or more specific genres, such as crime fiction, historical fiction, fantasy, or science fiction. Teaching delivery will involve a mixture of lectures and seminars, while teaching methods will include a variety of learning approaches. These may include reading novels and short extracts of fiction; drawing on theories of genre; exploring different contexts, from the current market to the evolution of genre fiction; in-class writing exercises; and offering critique.</p> <p>Students may read past and present bestsellers that conform to, and experiment with, generic tenets, as well as postmodern and contemporary experimentations with genre. This module will ground students in the commercial potential of genre fiction, a driving force in publishing, and deepen their understanding of how to write within one or more specific genres, as well as their understanding of essential and transferrable areas of fiction, such as plotting, world building and character.</p>

## STUDENT AND ACADEMIC SERVICES

**Teaching and Learning Methods:** Scheduled learning: Workshops, lectorials and seminars are at the core of this module's teaching and learning methods. This allows a flexible approach to be taken to combining lecturer input with practical work. This flexible approach also enables students to develop the skills necessary to engage with different modes of learning. The module may require students to work both independently and in small groups on a variety of tasks.

Guidance on work briefs and set reading or tasks will be available either in the module handbook, via the module information on UWE online or through any other vehicle deemed appropriate by the module/programme leaders.

Independent learning Independent study may include a variety of tasks such as written exercises, assignment preparation, and recommended further reading. It will be guided by a clear syllabus outline in the module handbook and preparation questions and/or tasks communicated via Blackboard.

A minimum of 36 hours contact time is provided for this module

### Part 3: Assessment

Students are required to submit a portfolio of work that include the outcomes of tasks set during the module. These tasks will be designed to enable students to demonstrate, for the purposes of assessment, the acquisition of skills, knowledge, understanding and/or experience that meets the learning outcomes for the module. The word count will be determined by the nature of the tasks set, and a clear indication of word count limits will be included in the module handbook.

Assessment by portfolio facilitates the curation of a selection of outputs demonstrating a range of ways in which the learning outcomes have been met, typically requiring students to respond to briefs/commissions as well as generating their own creative work and proposals (both of which are vital preparation for professional work).
