Part 2: Description

The aim of this module is to provide the student with an opportunity to undertake a short individual investigation in a subject related to their clinical practice. The topic for investigation must be agreed by an academic tutor from the student's programme.

The module allows students to take responsibility for their own learning, in an area of individual professional interest.

There are no taught classes in this module, the investigation will be carried out through independent study. The student will have 1:1 support from an academic tutor for a maximum of 4 hours; this may be in the form of face to face meetings, online facilitation or through other modes e.g. skype.
