Part 2: Description

Overview: Film work, show-reels and portfolios are the essential 'calling cards' for animation practitioners. In this module, students complete their major project work as well as other outputs in line with their defined Agenda of personal learning, creative practice and future career goals.

Features: Rough-cut screening reviews; the industry mentorship scheme and designated specialist supervisor support continues in this module; opportunity for direct industry engagement e.g. through live briefs, work-based learning; a concluding showcase screening event and exhibition of work.

Educational aims: The aim of this module is to enable students to complete and undertake a summative evaluation of their major project work and other outputs and to critically reflect on the development of their skills and competencies in the context of professional practice in the animation industry or fields of related practice. In addition, students engage in active planning in relation to their vocational trajectory and consolidate their on-line showreel/portfolio of practice and self-promotion materials.

Outline syllabus: Production, post-production, including the animation pipeline; sound design; developing entrepreneurial capability and effectiveness; career strategies and business planning; self-promotion, networking and personal brand creation; showcase screening event and exhibition planning.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: Students attend a series of lectures, seminars, group tutorials and individual supervision tutorials. In addition, workshops in sound design as well as surgeries related to animation practice support project work to completion. Students are encouraged to make use of the programme's comprehensive on-line animation and filmmaking enterprise and professional practice resource. Independent research, study and practice forms a substantial part of the activity of this module. Academic skills support, including subject-specific and generic workshops and online resources, is available from the Library. Academic skills support for international students is available from the Academic Learning Development team.

The report tests critical analysis and professional practice skills in line with the students' Agenda.

Regular formative feedback from tutors provides students with a clear understanding of their progress and how this can be improved. In addition, students participate in

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reviews and presentations where all students will be expected to contribute

constructive critique of presented work.

The assessment type has been chosen to enable students to demonstrate

achievement across all the learning outcomes of the module and to provide flexibility

in selecting appropriate and specific outputs. Students are assessed by criteria and

achievement standards that are identified within module handbooks, and individual

assignments and briefs. The assessment criteria take account of the level of
