Part 2: Description

Overview: This module is shared by all MA students in the 'Screen' domain.

Delivered at the beginning of the academic year, it brings together students from different pathways to develop the skills of close reading of varied forms of film; it also allows them a forum to share their passion for film. Leading academics will screen significant works of cinema, long and short, and lead seminars that analyse the style and creative choices of these films.

Features: Not applicable

Educational aims: This module develops students' critical skills in reading films, by implementing the close reading of movies in the tradition of style-based film criticism. The approach is applied to fiction and documentary films. An in-depth study of mise-en-scene explores the expressive craft of filmmaking. Students explore how meaning is created through the use of lighting, sound design, camera movement and framing, colour, production design, performance, blocking and VFX. The module interrogates the affective aspect of film style, examining how elements of mise-en-scene impact on viewer's senses and emotions.

Outline syllabus: The module examines the work of filmmakers in the twenty-first century, contextualising their films with reference to cinema texts from the post-war period. The syllabus has an emphasis on global cinema, examining the style of filmmakers within and across cultures.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The module is delivered with screenings followed by critical seminars led by academic experts in the fields of screen criticism and analysis.

Students are required to express their critical responses to film texts through discussion and presentation, ensuring originality of their ideas and their interpretation of meaning in the films.

Summative Assessment is by a portfolio of written and/or audiovisual work.

MO2 Demonstrate and apply knowledge of relevant critical approaches to the study of film.
