## STUDENT AND ACADEMIC SERVICES

### Part 2: Description

**Overview:** Students develop an independent project, building on the knowledge and skills learned on earlier modules. The project is self-directed and can take different forms, enabling students to specialise according to their professional ambitions.

**Educational Aims:** As the culmination of the course, this module offers the greatest scope for individual choice and extended independent study. It aims to enable students to develop the skills of independent research by extending what they have learned.

**Outline Syllabus:** Students develop an independent project, building on the knowledge and skills learned on earlier modules. The project is self-directed and can take different forms, enabling students to specialise according to their professional ambitions. The project's development is supported by tutorial supervision and occasional group meetings.

**Teaching and Learning Methods:** The project's development is supported by timetabled one-to-one tutorial supervision and occasional group meetings designed to provide a forum for discussion of work-in-progress and the opportunity for peer feedback. It is envisaged that students who take the 'Collaborative Dissertation' will benefit from input from the outside organisation which could be, for instance, one of Bristol's screen industry organisations (e.g. Fiona Francombe, CEO of The Bottle Yard Studios, or Mark Cosgrove, Cinema Curator at Watershed should they be studying exhibition, or Natalie Moore, Film Officer for Bristol City Council).

### Part 3: Assessment

The module offers three alternative but equally rigorous modes of assessment that afford appropriate opportunities for the range of students it is anticipated that these three closely aligned MAs would attract. They have been differentiated in order to enable both 'text-based' and 'practice-based' students to work to their strengths. For each alternative, assessment is divided between a proposal (20 per cent) and the project (80 per cent).

Component A, Element 1: Project Development Documents (20%)

The type of documents submitted will depend on the nature of the project, but will always include the initial proposal (2,000 words), a planning schedule and records of supervision meetings as a minimum requirement.

Component A, Element 2: Project (80%)

The Project will take one of the following three forms, enabling students to tailor the research to suit their interests, skills and career ambitions:

Critical Dissertation (10-12,000 words);

Collaborative Dissertation: an original research project developed with an outside organisation (approx. 8,000-10,000 word dissertation + 1-2,000 word executive summary);

Screen Industries Project: an original portfolio of work in a non-traditional format, (e.g., audiovisual essay, exhibition, documentary, screenplay) with a 3,000 word (approx.) rationale and evaluation.

Students receive guidance and formative feedback on their progress, including sharing draft work with the project supervisor. This process also ensures the work is original.
