## Part 2: Description

**Educational aims:** This module will enable students to deepen their understanding of organised crime, building on the basic theoretical knowledge gained in the underpinning core module (International Crime and Criminology). It will explore key questions surrounding the conceptual challenges posed by organised crime and the

difficulties inherent to categorising and defining such a complex and varying global phenomenon. Students will explore a range of key topical issues in the field of organised crime, engaging with key areas of research, policy and practice.

**Outline syllabus:** A key focus of the module concerns the conceptual challenges posed by organised crime, and the theoretical dilemmas this poses. Students will therefore be introduced to a wide range of topics which enable them to explore this in detail, including but not limited to:

What is a mafia? Categorising organised criminal groups

Fighting the mafia: lessons from Italy

Organised crime and Africa: key conceptual challenges

Organised crime and the environment

Sport and organised crime

Counterfeiting

Harm reduction approaches in organised crime

### **Part 3: Teaching and learning methods**

**Teaching and learning methods:** The module teaching will be supplemented by other arrangements such as tutorials and drop in sessions. Materials will be available ahead of the teaching sessions and take the form of questions, real-world case studies, vignettes and problem solving exercises based upon essential reading. Students will work collaboratively and independently to develop and critically apply their knowledge using these materials in the seminars. To help students prepare for assessments a lecture and a seminar will focus on the assessment.

**MO1** Critically evaluate differing definitions of organised crime

**MO2** Analyse the policy implications of a range of different definitions of organised crime

the module, in the form of verbal feedback and peer group discussions facilitated by the lectorial-style teaching format. The module will feature a dedicated session on assessment advice and support.
