Part 2: Description

Overview: As identified in the 'NMC Future nurse: Standards of proficiency for registered nurses' (Nursing Midwifery Council, 2018), nurses play a vital role in protecting and improving the mental and physical health and well-being of people, families, communities and populations at an individual, local, national and global level. They support and enable people at all stages of life to make informed choices about health behaviours and to empower communities to manage health challenges

to maximise quality of life and improve health outcomes. They are actively involved in the prevention of, and protection against disease and ill health, and engage in public health, community development and global health agendas, and in the

reduction of health inequalities.

Educational aims: This module examines current and emerging global health challenges, equipping future nurses with fundamental knowledge required for their role in health promotion, protection, and prevention of ill health.

Public Health (also known as Population Health) is a complex area of theory and practice that incorporates ideas on social change, development, political and social theory, political economy, medicine and biology, epidemiology, the environment, sustainability, and a number of other philosophical, theoretical, political, and practicebased fields. This module will explore different approaches within the field of public health, enabling students to identify, examine and gain knowledge of the wider determinants of health and their impact on health outcomes.

Outline syllabus: The indicative content of the module will draw from the Nursing and Midwifery Council's (NMC) Future Nurse Standards (2018) and content will include:

Current and emerging global health challenges

Principles of health promotion, protection, and the prevention of ill health

Epidemiology

The wider determinants of health, illness, and wellbeing

Health Inequalities

Diversity and inclusivity

Sustainability as a public health crisis

The social, economic, and political forces that affect global health

Health economics

The health systems and agencies involved in the field of public health

Assessment strategy: Formative assessment: Group Poster:

During the module students will have the opportunity to work as a group in creating

and submitting a poster. Posters will be based on one of the topics explored during

the module. Posters must be evidence informed and include an accompanying

reference list. This supports students in utilising evidence-based practice, which they

will need to demonstrate in their report. Students will receive written feedback on

their poster.

Summative assessment: 3,000 Word Report (Component A)

A maximum of 3,000-word report that discusses a contemporary global public health

challenge, with reference to its impact on a specific population. This population could

identify by age, gender, sexual orientation/identity, race, ethnicity, culture, disability

(seen or unseen), socioeconomic status or another demographic characteristic.

Examples will be provided within the module handbook. The report will also identify

and discuss relevant policies, interventions, or strategies toward addressing the

public health challenge, at both a regional, national, and global level.

The assessment type has been selected with consideration to the programme as a

whole and guided by the principles of the Inclusive Curriculum and Practice Toolkit

which aims to optimise learning for all students through developing multiple means of

representation and means of expression of learning outcomes.
