Outline syllabus: The indicative syllabus for this module includes: An Introduction to the Law of Tort The Tort of Negligence (Duty, Breach, Causation, Remoteness) Liability of occupiers and non-occupiers for dangerous premises Product Liability Employers' Liability at common law Vicarious Liability Nuisance (public and private) Trespass to land Defences Remedies

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods:

The learning on this online course will take place through a variety of modes including directed independent learning, self-directed learning, and group activities. Students will need to adopt a proactive approach to the course and engage with the full offer of learning opportunities to ensure successful achievement of the learning outcomes.

Directed independent learning includes engaging with resources such as recorded lectures, videos, and reading as well as guided activities for example preparing notes, case studies and worksheets. Self-directed learning includes activities such as reading, note-taking, research, and exploring resources. Group activities may include discussions, legal debate, collaborative working, and peer learning.

The module is designed to offer an authentic learning experience in which students apply the theoretical principles they have researched and studied to practical

Page 3 of 6 21 June 2023 scenarios. For example, students may be expected to be able to prepare and present brief outlines of and/or commentary on the relevant law; their analysis of specific problems and their 'solutions' to specific case studies in the small group sessions.

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: Obligations II (Law of Tort) is taught and assessed in the same Teaching Block as Obligations I (Contract Law), Criminal Law and Public Law. The assessment strategy for the module is informed by the need to provide a rigorous assessment regime (both as regards breadth and depth of coverage of the syllabus), whilst not imposing an unduly onerous assessment burden on the students, particularly whilst they are engaged in an intensive period of study. Assessment is through a 24-hour online examination at the end of the Teaching Block. Students will be required to select a specific number of questions to answer, with a word limit of 1250 per question. This format of assessment will allow coverage of an extensive range of the syllabus topics and the word limit will enable students to demonstrate an appropriately detailed knowledge and understanding of the relevant topics. The questions will consist of problem-based scenarios, requiring students to deploy the learning that they will have obtained from the legal research and engagement with primary and secondary sources undertaken during the study of the module. The question style will involve the students in formulating a coherent legal argument, based upon an analysis of the factual matrix of the guestion and a critical evaluation and application of the relevant legal principles. The assessment will require students to demonstrate effective written communication skills by articulating their response to each question with appropriate clarity, accuracy and economy, and doing so within a limited time period.
