### **Part 2: Description**

**Overview:** This module offers students the opportunity to develop relevant skills to further contextualise the critical understanding of the Police Constable role

**Features:** The module will require learners to immerse themselves in a number of challenging simulations relevant to the police officer role. Topics such as traffic, mental health, searching of persons, vehicles and premises will be brought alive

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through detailed and challenging practical exercises, helping learners to develop key skills and readying them for post graduate employment as an operational Police Officer.

This module does not follow the National Police Curriculum as it is not a pre-requisite for the accredited degree qualification.

**Educational aims:** Across the programme learners will take a deep dive into key operational aspects of the Police Constable role and in doing so they will be using their extensive academic knowledge in an immersive setting.

In the first part of the module learners will work together to develop key skills relevant to everyday policing activities such as Traffic stops, searching a premises, stop and search and dealing with people in crisis.

Following this students will work in small groups based on their intended pathway within the police; either response or detective, to deepen their understanding of the mindset and specialist skills each of these teams of officers requires.

In addition to this the module will offer the opportunity to learn more about different policing careers and how inter-professional working relationships can function to support members of the public.

**Outline syllabus:** This module explores a wide range of practical aspects of policing, and will allow learners to experience:

- Search of a vehicle
- Search of a premises
- Search of a person
- Stop and Search
- Open searches
- Powers of Entry
- Developing an investigative mindset
- Interviewing
- Traffic

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- Supporting people in Crisis

- Inter-Professional working

- Career Opportunities in the Police

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

**Teaching and learning methods:** The module will primarily employ a combination

of lectorials and simulation activities. Our pedagogy is interactive, discussion-based,

and student-facing. Students are an active part of the learning process, and will be

asked to contribute ideas, questions, and critical standpoints. The learning

environment is designed to promote peer-to-peer support and exchange.

In this module teaching and learning will be a mix of classroom based and simulation

activities.

Module Learning outcomes: On successful completion of this module students will

achieve the following learning outcomes.

**MO1** Demonstrate practical application of legislation, powers, codes of practice

and guidance during simulated scenarios.

MO2 Evaluate one's own performance during simulated scenarios, reflect on

strengths, weaknesses, and gaps in knowledge with reference to relevant

literature, and formulate strategies for future development.

MO3 Illustrate knowledge of the National Decision Model and the 'investigative

mindset' by applying theories, models, and principles to a nominated case study

simulation.

Part 4: Assessment

**Assessment strategy:** The assessment for this module will be a written task.

Component A - 2000 word Gap Analysis.

The assessment seeks encourage learners to identify and action plan in order to develop themselves for graduate employment within the Police. The module will

provide plentiful opportunities for reflection on their skills through various role play

scenarios and the learners will therefore be encouraged to use these opportunities to

reflect in a dynamic and timely way in preparation for their assessment. The action

plan aspect should be achievable and supportive in helping them reach their

intended career goal and to seek help, where necessary to do this.

Formative assessment of learning will take place during scheduled teaching building

on content taught and independent study tasks. Methods comprise of simulation

debriefs, question and answer sessions, group discussions and debates, in-class

knowledge checks, and work products as produced. Additional formative support will

be provided in study skills workshops on research, literature reviews, creation of

abstracts, and referencing.
