Part 2: Description

Overview: You will be cast and perform in public facing productions in your final year. These will normally be in professional venues in Bristol. The productions will enable you to exercise and synthesise the skills and techniques acquired throughout training.

This module builds on the work in Years 1 and 2 and will introduce you to elements

of the production process that you have not yet encountered, including the rewarding and complex relationship between professional creatives and a range of production arts and stage management roles. You will be reminded of the expected practices, disciplines and etiquettes of a professional theatre production.

You will enhance your learning by engaging in detailed research, rehearsals and advanced ensemble playing. You will employ individual and effective strategies for performance preparation and have the opportunity to implement the skills acquired throughout your course in order to create characters with complexity and emotional depth.

You will be expected to engage in independent learning that will include essential reading, character preparation, research preparation and delivery.

Features: Productions will be professionally directed (by visiting or in-house directors) and have full appropriate technical support (of, for instance, design, stage management, lighting and costume, etc.).

Productions are rehearsed and performed under professional conditions, using a range of approaches to acting and usual professional protocols (including technical and dress rehearsals) to prepare you for a career working in theatre and allied industries.

The use of cameras and online streaming may also feature as an aspect of the work of this module.

Productions are played to invited industry professionals and public audiences; this will introduce you to some key individuals in the field (agents, casting directors and directors) and ensure that you understand the complexities of the production process.

Educational aims: Taking part in fully realised productions will allow you to synthesize knowledge and experience acquired throughout the course. You will learn to conduct yourself in a professional manner regarding creative input, research and preparation, rehearsal etiquette, time-keeping and professional relationships with others working on the productions.

Outline syllabus: Performance preparation, including research and text analysis.

Rehearsals using professional protocols.

Individual calls and meetings (such as voice, make-up, hair and costume fittings) as required.

Technical and dress rehearsals, using industry professional protocols.

Performance in public productions.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: Learning is primarily through doing. You will be taught to rehearse in a sustained and considered fashion, working as part of a company. You will be guided to implement what you have learned in the first two years to prepare for rehearsals, actively contribute in an appropriate manner within the rehearsal room and remain sensitive to the overall style of the piece as led by the director. You will usually be steered from the rehearsal room to performance through technical and dress rehearsals where you will engage with creative and technical personnel.

This is a highly practical and experiential module in which you move through a rehearsal process, developing your performance over a number of weeks. You will be in a constant feedback loop with your director and other creatives (such as a voice coach, combat director and choreographer as appropriate). You will be given notes in the form of verbal feedback throughout.

Module Learning outcomes: On successful completion of this module students will achieve the following learning outcomes.

MO1 Apply an advanced understanding and interpretation of dramatic texts.

MO2 Organically embody a role, creating and inhabiting a sophisticated inner life whilst paying attention to the stylistic demands of the play and direction.

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MO3 Research, evaluate and interpret character, plot and structure of texts in a

sophisticated manner.

MO4 Communicate, and engage at an advanced level with the artistic

requirements and interpretation of the production as made explicit by the director

and other members of the creative team.

MO5 Work successfully in a live public theatre environment with other

performers, the director, designers, costumiers, stage managers, technicians

and audiences whilst working to professional standards of discipline, etiquette

and deadlines.

will be assessed on both rehearsal process and the realised performance. You will

receive verbal formative feedback while in rehearsals in the form of directors notes

and written summative feedback at the end of the production from your director.

choreographer and musical director where appropriate).
