#### **Part 2: Description**

**Overview:** The module will introduce students to the procedures and principles involved in preparing civil and criminal cases for court in the English and Welsh justice system. It will offer opportunity for students to apply legal knowledge from their previous studies of criminal, contract and tort law in a real world setting, gaining understanding of and skills in the preparation of cases for trial. It will be of particular

relevance to students intending to continue beyond the LLB to take the Solicitors Qualifying Examination or to study the Bar Training Course.

**Educational aims:** The aim of this module is to enable students to develop a systematic understanding of the stages of preparation involved in taking criminal and civil cases through from first client instruction through to readiness for trial.

## Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

**Teaching and learning methods:** The learning on this module will take place through a variety of modes including directed independent learning, self-directed learning, and group activities. Students will need to adopt a proactive approach to

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the module and engage with the full offer of learning opportunities to ensure

successful achievement of the learning outcomes.

Directed independent learning includes engaging with resources such as recorded

lectures, videos, and reading as well as guided activities for example preparing

notes, case studies and worksheets. Self-directed learning includes activities such

as reading, note-taking, research, and exploring resources. Group activities may

include discussions, legal debate, collaborative working, and peer learning.

The module will be delivered through lectorials and workshops to offer an authentic

learning experience in which students will apply the principles they have researched

and studied to practical scenarios. For example, students may be expected to be

able to prepare and present brief outlines of and/or commentary on tactical

approaches to managing a case; their analysis of specific problems and their

'solutions' to specific case studies in workshop sessions.
