Educational aims: On completion of the module the student will be able to demonstrate and exercise the knowledge, behaviours and attitudes in providing compassionate, safe and effective care; and support to people across the lifespan. The focus will be the skills required for the nursing associate to monitor conditions

and health needs of people within their care on a continual basis, and in partnership with families and carers. Ongoing assessment and recognition for further referral to other health professionals will be explored throughout the module. (NMC 2018)

Teaching and learning methods: The module will use a variety of teaching and learning methods: Lectures, seminars, case scenarios, reflective approaches, presentations, directed and independent learning, elearning, patient narratives.

Module Learning outcomes: On successful completion of this module students will achieve the following learning outcomes.

MO1 Recognise and explain the behaviours and attitudes required in providing compassionate, safe and effective person-centred care and support to people in a range of care settings and in partnership with other healthcare professionals.

Formative assessment: Students will be given the opportunity to complete a structured proforma that mirrors the summative assessment criteria in relation to their chosen case study. Proformas will be discussed within small peer groups under the supervision of a tutor. The peer group will ask for clarification of points that are not clear or have been omitted. As well as highlighting areas of good practice.

Summative assessment: A 3000 word case study enabling the student to draw on their practice experience and appropriate literature which reflects the person centred, patient/service user journey through an episode of ill health or recovery.
