Part 2: Description

Overview: From a few regimes of competition law in the world to over 120 jurisdictions, it is undeniable that the increase in significance and geographical scope during the last three decades has been impressive. Therefore, the role and place of competition law and policy in a globalised economy cannot be ignored.

The module is designed to include international and comparative elements such as the relationship between competition law and economics, the relationship between competition law and trade; the internationalisation process of competition law and policy, the territoriality principle (extraterritorial application) of competition rules in the EU, the US and other jurisdictions; the comparative study of key aspects of competition law in established systems such as EU competition law, US antitrust law, French, German, UK, Australian, and Japanese competition law regimes, and some of the newer competition systems such as those of BRICS nations, Viet Nam, Singapore and ASEAN EC. While the EU, the US and the UK regimes will be at the core of the comparative analysis, some of the other national regimes will be selected in agreement with the students and according to their own specific interests.

Educational aims: The aims of this module are:

To develop the intellectual skills of coherent description, synthesis, logical analysis and criticism in relation to a broad range of materials.

To enhance written and oral communication skills.

To prepare for employment through the development of transferable skills such as the ability to make critical judgements, to solve problems within the parameters of the law and to work independently and with others.

Outline syllabus: The following is an indicative list of topics that will be explored. The exact content of these workshops may be changed to reflect current trends in this subject area:

The relationship between competition law and economics

The relationship between competition law and trade

The internationalisation process of competition law

The fight against cartels, horizontal agreements and major developments

Vertical restraints

Mergers and the internationalisation of merger control

Dominant positions

Public and private enforcement and/or Competition law and Intellectual Property Law and/or competition law in the digital era

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The teaching and learning strategy emphasises a student-centred approach developed within or outwith smaller groups in class through group activities such as discussions, legal debates, practical exercises, current real case analysis. Some of these activities might be supported by the use of interactive technology if need be and/or practical.

To enhance the quality of the sessions, students will be expected to prepare and engage with a wide range of primary and secondary sources resources to further their knowledge by reading, for example, newspapers, academic papers and topical blogs and carry out the required work.

The module is designed for delivery through a combination of lectorials and workshops in which the relevant key concepts, principles, theories and approaches will be first communicated. They are based on preparation and participation and are designed to act as a place for discussion in which students are expected to examine, raise, critically assess and defend contrasting theoretical and conceptual points of view on controversial issues in class and, where appropriate to practise the law by applying it to contemporary facts and situations, to hone analytical and practical skills, as well as an opportunity to prepare for the assignment.
