Section 2: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes

Part A: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes

Overview: The International Law and Security LLM enables students to enhance their knowledge and systematic understanding within a specialised international law and security field and its interrelationship with other relevant disciplines. The programme provides students with the core legal knowledge and systematic understanding of the fundamental legal principles and the requisite skills in preparation for employment in legal practice, public sector organisations, and non-governmental organisations in the United Kingdom and internationally. Additionally, the programme allows students to explore the role of international law in tackling military, human, environmental and economic security issues. This involves dispute settlement or other practice-led exercises, some of which might be generated in collaboration with external organisations drawn from legal, non-governmental, and international organisations. Students will be able to use ideas at a high abstraction level, to develop critical responses, and suggest new concepts or approaches in international law and security. The overall aim is to create a holistic programmatic and individualised approach throughout the student's lifelong journey, establishing space within the programme for each student to build consistently on their academic and practical skills but also their personal and professional growth.

Features of the programme: The International Law and Security LLM engages with innovative learning and teaching strategies, research-led and practice informed teaching with the opportunity for students to develop their critical understanding of the law while engaging with some of the most pressing global issues impacting the world. Students will develop their own analytical skills needed to make reasoned, creative and original judgments regarding the development and practical application of the law in this area. The programme provides students with the core legal knowledge and systematic understanding of the fundamental legal principles and the requisite skills in preparation for employment in legal practice, public sector organisations, and non-governmental organisations in the United Kingdom and internationally.

Educational Aims: The programme is based on understanding law as both a vocational discipline and a subject of academic study. The programme seeks to reflect this by:

Equipping students with a systematic understanding of International Law and

Security.

Enabling students to develop skills for the gathering, critical analysis, and presentation of information, ideas, concepts and quantitative and qualitative data within a clearly defined context.

Equipping students to understand and apply major theories, principles and concepts to conduct advanced legal research.

Enhancing students' ability to communicate the results of their study and other work accurately and reliably.

Developing students' ability to look reflectively at their own professional practice.

Encouraging ethical decision-making, sustainability and global citizenship.

Enabling students to develop the qualities and transferable skills necessary for employment.

Encouraging lifelong learning and personal development

Assessment strategy: The programme adopts a programmatic assessment strategy which is built on inclusive authentic assessments. The strategy considers the different demographics of our students, together with the competencies, knowledge, and attributes they will gain upon completion of their studies with us. The strategy provides for formative assessments which will enable students to make use of feedback to develop their learning and skills.

In addition, the strategy considers the high rise of assessment offences through contract cheating and plagiarism or the recycling of essays. Therefore, a range of assessment styles are adopted with the aim of deterring assessment offences as well as meeting the aims of the programme learning outcomes whilst reflecting the learning in the modules.

Throughout our modules, students will have a single point of assessment. We take a programmatic approach to the assessment strategy by creating an interaction in the different module assessments. The assessment styles and formats are varied and set with the aim of developing their knowledge, problem solving, research and reflection on learning and personal and professional development. By way of example, the assessment methods include presentations, courseworks but also aspects of practice such as drafting of legal advice.

The variety and authenticity of our assessment styles will enable our students to

develop their academic and professional skills, helping students prepare for their transition into professional life.

Student support: Student support for all issues relating to the content, delivery and assessment of modules is provided by Module Leaders and for more general academic and professional concerns by the LLM Programme Leader.

Student Services Student Advisors are available to provide confidential advice where necessary on matters such as regulations, extenuating circumstances procedures, progression as well as personal issues such as ill health, time management etc. This services is supported by wider University provision and online resources.

Careers Guidance and a wide range of support in relation to employability is provided centrally by UWE Careers. Students seeking employment opportunities during their studies have access to the university's Job Shop.

All students are invited to participate in an Induction programme at the start of their studies. This includes specific guidance and orientation sessions for international students. The university's web pages provide access to detailed and up to date information covering all aspects of academic and administrative procedures and support. The LLM handbook provides details of a range of issues relating to all LLM programmes.

An important part of the programme is the involvement of students. Two or three student representatives are elected each year to serve on the Student Representatives and Staff Forum (SRSF). These are held every term to discuss issues raised by students in relation to their experience of studying on the programme and at UWE in general. Issues raised are discussed in an open and friendly atmosphere and students are encouraged to express their opinions. Issues raised are taken forward for action by the LLM Programme Leader.
