Section 2: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes

Part A: Programme Overview, Aims and Learning Outcomes

Overview: This Law postgraduate programme provides students with the opportunity to study integral parts of the international banking and financial system. It is designed to allow students to develop an ability to understand and critically comment on such fundamental issues as the importance of effective and proportionate financial regulation, the activities of traders and the relationship between the banking sector and financial crime. Practical understanding is encouraged by including analysis of high-profile financial scandals such as the collapse of the Bank of Credit Commerce International (BCCI), Barings Bank, Enron, WorldCom and Northern Rock thus enhancing employability. The programme supports one of the key aims of UWE, in seeking to foster a strong global outlook in students. It is designed to encourage innovation and creativity in assessing current problems at the cutting edge of international banking and finance law and in designing responses thus preparing graduates for employment in legal practice, commercial organisations especially in the banking sector and in the public sector both in the UK and abroad.

Educational Aims: The programme is based on an understanding of law as both a vocational discipline and a subject of academic study. The programme seeks to reflect this by:

Equipping students with an advanced understanding of various aspects of international banking and finance law and banking practice, focusing in particular on current developments from both an academic and practice perspective.

Developing the analytical skills needed to make reasoned, creative and original judgments regarding the development and practical application of commercial law.

Assisting students to develop greater intellectual autonomy and to become independent learners.

Refining students' ability to communicate effectively complex ideas in oral and written form.
