## Part 2: Description

**Overview:** This module will guide students towards a critical understanding of storytelling as an aspect of human experience. Human stories shape every aspect of how we see ourselves and the world around us. Students will explore approaches to stories within their discipline and be guided towards dialogue with cognate disciplines. Students on this module will build critical literacy and skills to help them navigate and shape this world of stories.

**Educational aims:** This module enriches each student's understanding of their Humanities degree subject. Through an interdisciplinary approach, students will get to grips with the demands of ethical and collaborative practice. Within the thematic focus of the module, students will critically examine a range of materials, approaches, and practices. Through human stories, students will reflectively measure, develop, and communicate their skills. These skills include: evaluating and analysing materials; putting concepts into practice; communicating and collaborating; self-reflecting; recognising the ethical dimensions of working in a Humanities discipline.

**Outline syllabus:** The module will explore the complex world of narratives across the study of creative writing, film, language, literature, history, and media. Students will consider the personal, public, and political importance of storytelling. These topics will be approached via interdisciplinary and subject-specific learning opportunities. Students will be required to consider the ethical dimensions of individual, group, and disciplinary creation and consumption of stories.

### **Part 3: Teaching and learning methods**

**Teaching and learning methods:** The module will take a skills-based approach to guide students to be effective, ethical, and reflective learners. Students will put ideas into practice across a range of formats, including lectures and small-group sessions. This will be accomplished through research-informed teaching within disciplinary areas. An emphasis on dialogic learning will facilitate cross-disciplinary discussion.

**Module Learning outcomes:** On successful completion of this module students will achieve the following learning outcomes.

**MO1** Explore and develop ideas that lead to new perspectives and approaches.

**MO2** Show an understanding of safe working practices and reflect on ethical responsibilities as a practitioner in their field.

**MO3** Demonstrate an understanding and awareness of the benefits of collaborative practice in the student's field.

**MO4** Examine source material to develop informed judgments that go beyond initial reactions.
