**Educational aims:** See learning outcomes.

Outline syllabus: With tutorial support, students devise their own programme of

work for the module building on the Preparation for Extended Study module.

Through this process students are expected to negotiate access to resources as

demanded by their proposal. The consolidation, application and development of technical skill and use of materials is selected according to the intentions explicit in the work.

During the module students compile a Research File that contains contextual and cultural reference material that is informing their work, and which may include a written commentary explaining the relevance of this to their own practice.

A text (written or alternative format submission) presented with the final body of work demonstrates an understanding of individual creative practice in relation to contemporary critical and cultural discourses. This text also requires students to critically reflect on research sources, application of methodology and the relation of the text to their original intentions and production of artefacts.

The module is realised through the exhibition and presentation of a body of work and an accompanying critical text (2,500). This work, including evidence of research and development forms the basis for assessment.

# Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

**Teaching and learning methods:** This module focuses on a student's ability to direct and manage their own learning support through tutorial discussion and feedback. Students negotiate appropriate technical support both within and beyond the confines of the institution. The ability to evaluate their needs in relation to the proposal is seen as central to the demonstration of personal creative development and professional practice.

Scheduled learning includes lectures, seminars, tutorials, project supervision, workshops; external visits; supervised time in studio/workshop.

Independent learning includes hours engaged with essential reading, assignment preparation and completion etc. These sessions constitute an average time per level as indicated in the table below.

Students can expect a total of 144 hours scheduled contact time for this module within the context of their other learning and teaching activities. This includes tutorials, group critiques, lectures, seminars, site visits / field trips, studio-based sessions, inductions, workshops, field work, work-based learning or project supervision.

Contact time may also take a synchronous virtual form rather than face-to-face, through the use of email discussion groups, virtual learning environments (VLEs) and other technology-aided means. It can also take place in a work-based setting.

Part 4: Assessment

**Assessment strategy:** Assessment strategies within the programme that this module contributes to reflect the Faculty of Art, Creative Industries and Education's philosophy which considers assessment to be part of the learning process.

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demonstrates engagement with the minimum number of learning hours for the

module (contact and independent study hours).

Forms of assessment used as part of the overall programme include:

Presentation and participation in studio-critique

Poster presentation

Group and individual visual presentations

Group and individual verbal presentations

Written Assignments – forms of writing relevant to the creative industries, including

academic/essay and industry focused/report writing

Group critiques

Peer and self-assessment

Evaluative and reflective outcomes, including visual, verbal and written

Formative and summative assessment activities that involve students participating in the evaluation of presented work (their own and others') take place throughout the programme. Participation in and attendance at these sessions forms part of the

assessed content of the module as a result of this.

Feedback (verbal and/or in writing) at regular points throughout the module provides students with a clear understanding of their progress and advice about how this can

be improved
