### **Part 2: Description**

**Overview:** The emphasis of this module is to deliver key skills and knowledge to enable students to co-create outcomes using photography as a tool of communication and engagement; generating ideas and outcomes with an understanding of a given context.

The module asks students to explore ways of developing and locating their individual creative process within a space of co-production.

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Features: Not applicable

**Educational aims:** Through a combination of short form activities and longer form

briefs students will work individually and in small groups to creatively respond to

assignment briefs; developing their awareness of the relationship of photographic

work to particular context(s). To set their own creative point of view alongside that of

others in a co-produced form of output.

Students will begin to test/evaluate and apply appropriate methods of production to

communicate clearly to an identified audience or context. The module explores the

importance of research and addresses key transferable skills; considering how they

might relate to wider creative contexts.

Outline syllabus: This module addresses the role of individual creative practice as a

part of a wider co-created process. Students will devise personal responses to

creative assessment briefs before bringing them together to form a coherent

collective output in a related context.

To support the development of practical outcomes, students undertake a series of

lectures and technical workshop activities that will introduce them to contexts

relevant to photographic practice, such as publication formats, and to relevant digital

software and hand-production techniques that will enable them to devise, plan and

execute a collective response.

Students will be required to document their practical and research processes as a

reflective tool and research aid. Students will engage in critical analysis of their

outputs and wider creative process through the development and production of work

within a studio environment.

## Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

**Teaching and learning methods:** The module is delivered via lectures, seminars, peer group presentations and critiques, workshops, individual critique and independent study.

Students will build upon experiences from activities located in team working in other modules. Teaching sessions will introduce students to practices relevant to forms of co-produced outputs that are designed to challenge students' pre-conceptions about their subject discipline.

Students will begin to test, evaluate and apply appropriate methods of project development and production to communicate clearly to an identified context. Students may work across digital and print processes, generating, editing and sequencing content. The module explores the importance of research in the support of a creative process that is to students' interests, and ambitions. Students will be able to reflect upon experiences in relation to key transferable skills and consider how they might be used in a wider creative or professional context.

Students are supported to develop an active approach to learning and studio practice using a variety of materials and methods. The principle of 'learning through making' is approached in relation to practically based studio activities, which are then expanded through an exploration of contemporary practice.

Projects allow students to explore skills/methodologies and bring contextual

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understanding to the development of their own practice. Group work focuses on

developing personal methodologies, timekeeping, critical awareness and

organisational skills.

Students can expect scheduled contact time for this module within the context of

their other learning and teaching activities. This can include tutorials, group crits,

lectures, seminars, site visits/field trips, studio-based sessions, inductions,

workshops and field work.

Module Learning outcomes: On successful completion of this module students will

achieve the following learning outcomes.

MO1 Evaluate information from various sources, identifying key ideas and

understanding different perspectives.

**MO2** Test forms of visual media to effectively communicate ideas.

MO3 Apply appropriate methods of project production with consideration of

context(s).

**MO4** Critically evaluate their own work, identify areas for improvement and adapt

their learning strategies based on feedback and experience.

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: This module will be assessed as Pass/Fail.

Referral assessments will be comparable to the first sit.

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Assessment tasks will require the development of portfolio that includes a body of

creative practical work, along with supporting materials (that document analysis and

reflections on research and practical processes) and an individual summative

evaluation of the creative process. Alternative modes of submission that have been

agreed with the programme will be accepted for this module.

The module assessment strategy enables the student to demonstrate achievement

across all the learning outcomes of the module. The principle of 'learning through

making' is core to the learning strategies in the programme: these learning activities

are then expanded into and through the exploration of contemporary practice in

relevant and related subject areas.

The assessment type has been chosen to enable such outcomes as well as to

provide flexibility in selecting appropriate and specific outputs. Formative and

summative assessments are designed to provide the opportunity for students to

understand and reflect upon their achievements and to support the monitoring of

progress by tutors and students.

Formative Feedback

Formative feedback activities that involve students participating in the evaluation of

presented work (their own and others) take place throughout the module. All

students will be expected to contribute to the critical evaluation of fellow students'

work. Feedback (verbal and/or in writing) at regular points throughout the module

provides students with a clear understanding of their progress and advice about how

this can be improved.
