Part 2: Description

Overview: This module continues from UFCFYT-30-1 Music. Students will build upon and develop existing skills in music theory, music and sound composition, music performance/collaboration and music history and appreciation. Advanced approaches to music theory and applications of music technologies will be taught through contemporary music composition techniques that will lead to practical outputs of music and sound compositions and arrangements. There will be an expectation of individual practical musicianship or collaborations to be developed

through demonstrations and recordings. Music history and appreciation will be taught through the study of key repertoire, developing students contextual awareness of the practical work they are undertaking.

Features: Not applicable

Educational aims: This module is designed to allow students to develop:

- their musical abilities in music and sound composition for a range of instrumental and vocal forces and appropriate contemporary technologies

- analysis skills and aural appreciation of a wide range of contemporary music
- reflective practice
- skills in practical musicianship and/or musical collaboration

Outline syllabus: The broad topics covered are:

- The development of contemporary music and sound compositional techniques in the 20th century to today, focusing on Electroacoustic Music and music for Film and TV

- Aural analysis of core complementary repertoire
- Arrangement and orchestration
- Producing sheet music
- The compositional process
- Key professional skills for the 21st century composer
- Reflective practice

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The module will be delivered through a mix of lectorials and workshops, designed to suit both current learning approaches and a wider range of modes of attendance and distance learning.

The short lecture component of lectorials will provide the technical, organisational and theoretical concepts and general background to the key skills being developed in the module.

The practical tutorial element will support and inform work undertaken for the

Page 3 of 6 18 February 2025 assessments and provide a platform for the student to demonstrate and regularly discuss their developing skills in composition, analysis, reflective practice, musicianship, collaboration and wider relevant professional skills.

Module Learning outcomes: On successful completion of this module students will achieve the following learning outcomes.

MO1 Understand and undertake music and sound composition in different musical and artistic contexts using a range of advanced contemporary compositional techniques

MO2 Develop practical musicianship skills and related collaborative practices through the production of relevant shareable assets

MO3 Demonstrate critical, analytical and reflective skills with regard to their own and others' musical composition

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: Formative feedback - including peer assessment - will be given regularly in taught sessions.

Summative assessment will take the form of two portfolios, one per teaching term, each worth 50% of the module marks. The portfolios will contain music and sound compositions and arrangements aligned to the topics taught in a particular term, with scope for individual artistic expression. The focus of each term is stylistically different, allowing students to compose in contrasting contexts, as in industry.

Page 4 of 6 18 February 2025 Students will be given appropriate professional-style briefs and they will deliver appropriate materials that align to what is expected in industry, which includes musical scores, audio, and recordings where the brief involves an element of performance or collaboration. Accompanying this will be a piece of written reflection on the process of composing the portfolio, giving students the opportunity to interrogate their creative process and extract as much useful learning and selfawareness as possible to aid their compositional development.

All work is individual.

The resit assessment strategy would be identical. Two portfolios, each worth 50% of the module marks.
