Part 2: Description

Overview: This module will explore the institutions and the fundamental concepts and principles of world trade law. It will notably examine how they regulate international economic relations between States, including economic national, regional and international security.

The assessment regime will provide students with the opportunity to work in the world trade law context: Collate and evaluate information from different sources;

Features: Opportunities to develop individual academic and practice skills, research skills, and problem-solving skills.

Educational aims: This module will provide students with the opportunity to acquire a systematic understanding of the law as it pertains to global trade.

Students will develop the ability to research and critically analyse the law and legal systems, and to create and interpret knowledge, as related to world trade law, applying this in scholarly contexts.

Communication and problem-solving skills will be advanced.

Outline syllabus: The syllabus of the module reflects contemporary developments, law, or interests in the field, and so is subject to change. The following is an indicative list of topics to be explored:

Introduction to concepts, actors, and legal and institutional framework of world trade

Globalised economy and trade, and economic national, regional and international security

International economic, trade and financial institutions (World Trade Organisation, International Monetary Fund, World Bank, etc)

General principles of World Trade Organisation law

Exceptions to the general principles

Regional trade agreements

Global trade and developing/less developed countries

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Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: Lectures and 'spotlight' learning are delivered via online recordings. Self-guided independent learning is facilitated via tasks which codify and formatively assess understanding and skills. Reading lists are provided for every study unit. Opportunities to explore topics and substantiate understanding with a tutor and/or peers is provided via asynchronous discussion boards, virtual learning environments, and other media.

Students are required to engage with a wide range of primary and secondary legal and non-legal sources to further their understanding and skills.

Module Learning outcomes: On successful completion of this module students will achieve the following learning outcomes.

MO1 Demonstrate systemic understanding of world trade law and multilateral trading system and effectively communicate arguments a lay audience.
