Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The learning on this module will take place through a variety of modes including directed independent learning, self-directed learning, and group activities. Students will need to adopt a proactive approach to the module and engage with the full offer of learning opportunities to ensure successful achievement of the learning outcomes.

Directed independent learning includes engaging with resources such as recordings of lectures and directed reading, preparing for, and participating in workshops. Self-directed learning includes activities such as reading, note-taking, and undertaking pre-workshop activities. Group activities may include discussions, collaborative working, and peer learning.

The module is designed through lectorials and workshops to offer an authentic learning experience in which students will apply the legal principles they have

studied to practical scenarios. For example, students may be expected to be able to prepare and present brief outlines of and/or answers on the relevant law; their analysis of specific problems, and their 'solutions' to specific case studies in the small group sessions. They will also engage in presenting legal arguments in the

context of a practical case scenario.
