Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: The assessment strategy is designed to substantively determine the knowledge and understanding of students across the Public Law syllabus.

Essay: approx 2000 words, with scope for variation based on prompt set (60%). This written assessment tests academic rigour, argumentation, application of fundamental rules and concepts in Public Law, and legal analysis.

Presentation (40%). Recorded oral presentation to test the ability to research the law, apply it, and present findings in a structured environment; supported by a short written supplement.
