Part 2: Description

Overview:

This module examines Equity, the area of law which has developed to minimise the injustice caused by common law rules, and explores methods by which it does so.

The module will be delivered as a separate module, but presented programatically together with Land Law as Principles of Property Law.

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It will be linked to the Student Lawyer project, where students will explore aspects of Private law through project work involving external engagement as well as personal

and professional development activities.

Educational aims: The aims of the subject are to enable the student to appreciate the relationship of equity to law; to understand the conceptual basis of the trust; to

acquire knowledge of the main substantive areas of trust law; and to appreciate the

nature and scope of equitable remedies. Students will be encouraged to evaluate the present-day relevance of established equitable doctrines, to appreciate the creativity

of equity in developing basic equitable principles and extending their areas of

application, and to gain an understanding of the principal uses of the trust in modern

society. Students will be encouraged to make links with other areas of study where

appropriate, particularly property law and contract.

Evidential matters will also be considered where appropriate.

The module is connected to the Student Lawyer Project, which will be delivered

programmatically across the year. Through the projects students will extend their

academic studies into wider exploration of legal themes, external engagement, and

ongoing reflection on their own personal and professional development with the aim

of supporting their wider development across their individual student journey.

Outline syllabus:

The indicative syllabus for the module is:

History and principles of equity:

Considers the historical beginnings of equity and the key principles that it developed.

Formalities for the disposition of property:

Looks at the statutory formalities for disposing of property and the circumstances in

which equity chooses to ignore these.

Constructive trusts of the family home:

Examines the development of constructive trusts in providing a remedy to

cohabitants.

Proprietary estoppel:

Provides a remedy to certain informal agreements in relation to property rights.

Three certainties:

Considers the requirements for the creation of a valid trust.

Disposition of property upon death:

A detailed look at the exceptions equity provides to the formal requirements of a will to leave property upon death.

Charities:

Examines the types of purposes that can be charitable and how charities are created and regulated.

Fiduciary duties and constructive trusts:

There are onerous duties placed upon fiduciaries that must be considered, along with the remedies that are available against third parties interfering with the trust.

Trustee investments:

Considers the statutory regulation of trustees and their duties in making investments.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The study of the law of trusts provides a demanding opportunity to develop legal method skills and analytical ability through oral and written discussion. Students are introduced to each topic through the medium of a weekly lectorial. Students are then required to prepare for the weekly interactive workshop through reading the materials provided and via the Reading List.

Independent work will encourage students to discuss the legal principles and details

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of the law relevant to the topic area and to analyse the situations in the workshop

problem scenarios and their legal implications and the rights and remedies of the

parties involved. For the workshops, students are required to develop their

knowledge of the legal topic further to think more deeply about the purpose of the

law and its effectiveness. Students are expected to be able to present brief outlines

of and/or commentary on the relevant law; their analysis of specific problems and

their 'solutions' to specific case studies to the group.

Through the Student Lawyer Project students will engage in project work which will

further support their development of independent learning skills; research; team

work; time management; presentation skills and the capacity for effective reflection

on their learning.
