Part 2: Description

Overview: The emphasis throughout will be placed upon providing the student with the opportunities to question, understand, analyse and evaluate the Law and associated issues in their historical, practical/technical, academic and social contexts.

It will be linked to the Student Lawyer project, where students will engage in wider

project work involving external engagement as well as personal and professional development activities.

Educational aims: In addition to the stated Module Learning Outcomes, the educational experience may explore, develop, and practise but not formally and discretely assess the following:

an ability to analyse the social, economic, ethical and political contexts in which the Law relating to the internet, social media, information security and human rights has developed and continues to evolve, including through proposals for reform of the law.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The learning context is student-centred and utilises a variety of techniques, including lectures and interactive workshops, to encourage independent thought and constructive criticism.

Dialogue is promoted between students and staff in an interactive relationship that emphasises the two-way flow of information and critique.

Students will be encouraged to conduct research via both traditional and electronic sources.

Through the Student Lawyer Project students will engage in project work which will further support their development of independent learning skills; research; team work; time management; presentation skills and the capacity for effective reflection on their learning.

Module Learning outcomes: On successful completion of this module students will achieve the following learning outcomes.

MO1 Demonstrate an ability to analyse the social, economic, ethical and political contexts in which the Law relating to the internet and social media has developed and continues to evolve, including through proposals for reform of the law.

MO2 Demonstrate an understanding of the application of Civil and Criminal Law to activities on the internet and social media.

MO3 Demonstrate the ability to undertake effective research, analysis and evaluation of primary and other source materials such as Government papers, statutes, cases, reports and articles using both traditional library materials and information technology resources.

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: This module is assessed by a combination of a written courseworks.

Written assignment (40%) - 1500 words based on preparation of a practical written advice to a client.

This assessment task will assess a student's ability to apply knowledge to solve problems and in relation to a given topic; produce a synthesis of relevant issues, evaluate and analyse those issues and communicate effectively in writing.

Written Assessment : Essay (60%) 2000 word coursework.

This assessment task is designed to enable students to demonstrate their academic skills. The written assignment will normally involve the examination of legal issues raised by the development in the use of information technology. In particular this assessment will assess a students' skills in research, synthesis, evaluation and analysis.

A proportion of this module's mark will come from the Student Lawyer Project.
