Educational aims: The purpose of the module is to give students an understanding of the rules and principles of matters which frequently arise in criminal courts.

Outline syllabus: The module covers vulnerable witnesses, expert evidence, defence statements, submission of no case to answer, contested character applications and an appeal against conviction and sentence.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The module requires the students to demonstrate advanced advocacy skills in a range of criminal applications before a range of tribunals. This includes effectively dealing with judicial intervention during submissions.

In addition the module requires the students to research and draft notices and appeals.

The module is taught via lectures and interactive skills seminars, many of which will take place in the court rooms.

Student performances are recorded to enable post seminar reflection.

MO1 Evaluate a set of facts in order to advise on a course of action and to draft relevant documentation

MO2 Analyse and evaluate a brief to create a line of argument which is persuasive and logical in the context of the brief and instructions.
