### **Part 2: Description**

**Overview:** This module introduces students to some of the many varieties of non-academic but still professional writing about film, including reviews, feature articles, interviews, podcasts, screening notes, festival programmes, marketing and publicity. It explores the creative, critical, and commercial contexts of such materials and helps students to develop a range of practical skills. This includes writing from original concept to final draft, pitching, interviewing, editorial roles, and group work.

Features: Not applicable

**Educational aims:** Students explore different forms of professional writing, such as film reviews, criticism, editorial features, interviews, festival websites, programme notes and publicity materials. Working in small teams, students develop a project combining different types of writing, such as a film magazine issue, film programme or film festival website.

This includes pitching the project concept, embedding professional experience and enterprise skills.

**Outline syllabus:** Students study examples of film writing, developing critical and commercial awareness of the role of different kinds of publication (both mainstream and specialist) and their audiences.

Students also develop a range of writing skills adapted to different professional contexts.

## Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

**Teaching and learning methods:** Workshop exercises support students' development of relevant professional and enterprise skills (e.g., pitching proposals to editors/funders, interview techniques, teamwork, editorial planning and commissioning, copy editing).

Student learning is supported with the publication of the lecture PowerPoint in advance of the session.

A reading list and assignment briefs are available online from the beginning of the course. Recordings of each lecture will be made available to students.

Throughout the course and specifically in preparation for the assignments, students will be offered advice in class well before the deadline and there will be opportunities for tutorials (both online and face to face), as well as formative feedback on in-class exercises and draft work.
