## **Part 2: Description**

**Overview:** Film Style and Meaning introduces students to a range of key terms and concepts needed to analyse film texts in close critical and contextual detail. In addition to this, it also investigates the role of film criticism in contemporary film culture, both in written and in audiovisual formats.

**Educational aims:** The module introduces students to the key terms, concepts and skills needed to analyse film texts in close critical and contextual detail.

**Outline syllabus:** The module introduces students to the key terms, concepts and skills needed to analyse film texts in close critical and contextual detail. Students learn how to describe and analyse aspects of film style, including sound, mise-en-scene, cinematography, editing and special effects. We also explore affective dimensions of film style, reflecting on how elements such as sound, framing, colour, rhythm and pace impact on our experience and understanding of film. We study a range of filmmaking styles, including different film forms, genres and movements.

This knowledge is then put into practice by exploring the role of film criticism in contemporary film culture. Students explore these different approaches through formative tasks, enhancing their own writing skills and audiovisual literacy by learning basic website, layout and digital editing skills.

### **Part 3: Teaching and learning methods**

**Teaching and learning methods:** Scheduled learning: Lectures provide frameworks for each week's topic, including a weekly screening. Workshops involve group discussion and practical exercises, learning basic technical skills. Students also explore different approaches to film analysis and film criticism through practical exercises, enhancing their own communication skills in the process.

Independent learning: Students will be expected to spend approximately 3-4 hours a week preparing for workshops by completing a practical task and a short reading to develop their skills and understanding. Students will also be expected to do further independent study as part of preparing their final portfolio.

## **Part 4: Assessment**

**Assessment strategy:** The module aims to enable students to develop key skills in film analysis and criticism through workshop exercises. These skills feed directly into the assessment strategy. The assessment enables students to focus on individual areas of interest, drawing on a range of different skills: written, verbal, analytical, creative and technical.

Students will have some flexibility as to the forms and topics they include, enabling them to respond to their own learning style and skills, reflecting student diversity. Since the work is developed through workshop activities, the possibility of plagiarism is significantly reduced; tutors will see work-in-progress develop over the course of the module. Formative assessment points enable students to feed-forward tutors' comments to improve their skills before submitting the final Portfolio.

## Assessment 1: Portfolio

The Portfolio comprises a rationale (500 words) and three pieces of film criticism:

- \* At least one piece will be written criticism (approx. 1000 words).
- \* At least one piece will be an audiovisual format (e.g., 2 min. audio-visual essay).

The assignment will be marked on a pass/fail basis.

The resit assignment will be the same as the first sit.
