Part 2: Description

Overview: This module supports students to specialise in the areas of historical research that interest them. It enables students to engage with in-depth study of focused research-led topics of their choice.

Features: Not applicable

Educational aims: Students will study two subject strands chosen from a changing suite of research-led options, enabling them to pursue research interests developed

at Level 5. The subject strands draw on the History team's expertise to provide rigorous and research-informed courses of study that require Level 6 skills in terms of critical reading, analysis and evaluation of evidence, and engagement with historical and critical concepts.

Outline syllabus: Subject strands may include but are not limited to:

Politics, Religion and Society in Britain, 1640-1660

The Spanish and French Republics and the Fascist Challenge, 1931-45

Stalin in Stalinism

Youth and Youth Culture in Modern Britain

Global Decolonisation

International Politics in North Africa and the Middle East

The United States and the Globalisation of Crime

History in the Public Space (Professional Placement)

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: Teaching and learning will be delivered through a combination of lectures, workshops, and personal tutorials. Students will choose to participate in two subject strands out of a range of options, with each strand reflecting areas of specialism within the History team. Both subject strands will have dedicated contact time each week. Reflecting the depth of learning expected at Level 6, the module is delivered across the entire academic year.

Student learning will be supported on the VLE, where reading lists, weekly preparation materials, and teaching slides are posted. Students can also access detailed assessment briefs from the start of teaching and will be offered personalised assessment advice during scheduled teaching time.

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: Assessment consists of two portfolios (5,000-word or

equivalent), one per student-selected subject strand.

Portfolios consist of a maximum of three elements and are based on the principle of

cumulative assessment: shorter or working exercises are completed to feed into and

develop a substantial piece for the final portfolio task. For example, this might take

the form of a 1,000-word document exercise, a 20-minute presentation and a 3,000-

word research essay; or for the professional placement, a reflective logbook kept for

the duration of the placement, used to underpin a final critical reflection.

Diverse portfolio tasks ensure appropriate assessment of different historical topics

and approaches, and this approach supports inclusive assessment practices. It

provides students with different opportunities to demonstrate their strengths and

develop new skills. The detailed feedback provided on the first (and second) element

of the portfolio (both in written form and orally in feedback tutorials) will enable

students to refine and develop their ideas and produce their best work in the final

project.

Portfolio assessment guidelines will be included in the module handbook, setting out

the principles and parameters of the portfolio and portfolio tasks to ensure parity and

cohesion across subject strands and modules.
