Part 2: Description

Overview: Poets are the "unacknowledged legislators" of society, and in this module, the critical and expressive aspects of poetics combine with the intellectual rigour of cultural commentary to throw focus on developing sharp ideas suitable for publication today and inventive texts that explore and push forward the limits of our understanding.

Educational aims: In this module, you will explore the character of the conversation that poetry can have with the world, the ways in which poets and other cultural commentators interpret the world through their writing, and how writers can contribute to ongoing debate and discussion in relation to subjects such as societal change. Enquiry into the nature of the 'new' underpins this course, with an interest in both new modes of creative expressions and new forms, which fuel its inherent emphasis on curiosity.

Issues of race, class and social justice will be foregrounded, building on work from separate modules. The reading list will represent this accordingly.

Using the PERMA framework as means of structuring in class learning behaviours during the term, students will build a route towards publishing through the development of new poetry and the critiquing of new poetry.

The module offers a chance to explore and contrast creativity and reflection. Students will research understanding genre conventions, narrative structures and literary influences. They will engage in peer feedback and editorial discussions, participating in analytical thinking and reflection – critically assessing published fiction and applying insights to their own work, namely:

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: Scheduled learning

Workshops and seminars are at the core of this module. This allows a flexible approach to be taken to combining workshop and seminar sessions, and to combining lecturer input with practical work. This flexible approach also enables students to develop the skills necessary to engage with different modes of learning. Students will develop a module workbook, which may contain, for example, completed exercises, original notes, outline and plans. The module may require students to work both independently and in small groups on a variety of tasks. Guidance on work briefs and set reading or tasks will be available either in the module handbook, via the module information on UWE Online or through any other vehicle deemed appropriate by the module/programme leaders.

Independent learning

Independent study may include a variety of tasks such as written exercises, assignment preparation, and recommended further reading. It will be guided by a clear syllabus outline in the module handbook and preparation questions and/or tasks communicated via the VLE.
