Part 2: Description

Overview: This module explores mass atrocities - such as genocide, crimes against humanity, and human rights abuses - as well as local, national and international responses to them. In doing so, it engages with key questions, critiques, and debates surrounding justice and accountability for atrocities in global politics.

Features: Not applicable

Educational aims: This module explores atrocities in global politics through a focus on a range of theoretical concepts, such as political violence, evil, international crimes and human rights violations. Through a range of case studies, the module also examines responses to atrocities, such as criminal trials, truth commissions, memorialization and humanitarian intervention, and in doing so explores contemporary debates surrounding the idea of justice and accountability in global politics.

Outline syllabus: In this module students will:

Explore the challenges posed by atrocities in global politics

Investigate international, national and local responses to mass atrocities

Evaluate the adequacy of international, national and local response to mass atrocities

Critically engage with key debates concerning justice and accountability in global politics

Module content may include:

Evolution of Human Rights International Criminal Law Humanitarian Law Intervention Genocide

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The module is delivered via a weekly lectorial.

The module's pedagogy is interactive, discussion-based, and student-facing.

Students are an active part of the learning process, and will be asked to contribute ideas, questions, and critical standpoints. The learning environment is designed to promote peer-to-peer support and exchange.

While teaching and learning will be predominantly classroom based, appropriate use will be made of online resources and digital learning platforms.

Module Learning outcomes: On successful completion of this module students will achieve the following learning outcomes.

MO1 A critical evaluation of the main ideas and concepts surrounding mass atrocities in global politics

MO2 The ability to apply the main ideas and concepts surrounding mass atrocities in global politics to case studies.

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: Reflective Essay (maximum 2000 words)

The reflective essay will allow students to develop a fine-grained analysis of the issues and theories that will be introduced in the module, and to critically assess the role of justice and accountability in global politics.

Page 4 of 6 09 August 2024 The format of the reflective essay may include discourse analysis, cultural reflection, critical text review or document analysis.

Students will be able to select from a range of materials to base their reflective essays on, such as political resolutions, international treaties, political speeches, or contemporary pieces of artwork.

Students will be supported in the lead-up to this assessment through a range of seminar activities (e.g. discourse analysis; cultural reflections) throughout the module, which will build the skills required to complete this piece of assessment.

Opportunities for formative input and feedback will be built into the delivery of the module. The input and feedback will help develop topic and assessment understanding, target future reading, and enable students to engage more critically with the contents of the module.
