Part 2: Description

Overview: The module will introduce students to appropriate topics and approaches to Psychological research and theorising. They will also be introduced to the key transferable skills that studying Psychology will help them develop as they progress.

Educational aims: Whilst working through this module, learners peer relationships will be developed through group work relevant to the context of Psychology.

Outline syllabus: Specifically, the module will introduce the following:

Introduction to perspectives in Psychology.

Selected topics in Developmental, Cognitive, Social, Humanistic and Differential

Psychology.

Practical introduction to selected research designs, methods and data analysis -

including experiments and surveys; psychophysiological measurement techniques

and psychometrics; descriptive and inferential statistics using both paper and pencil

and statistical software.

Learning Skills. Within the context of the Group Work and Presentation, students will

engage in activities relating to this task: academic reading and writing, literature and

information searching, use of appropriate software for presentations, time

management, planning.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: A variety of learning approaches will be used.

Taught sessions will utilise TEL where possible, to support pedagogy of Inductive

Learning where the students will engage in facilitated activities such as, debates,

case studies, problem based learning etc.

Workshop sessions will provide opportunities for data handling and interpretation,

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problem solving and discussions with academic staff.

Student independent learning (>70% of module allocated time) will be supported with

interactive revision material, workbooks and the University's E-Learning Environment

Scheduled learning: includes lectures and workshops.

Independent learning: includes hours engaged with essential reading, assignment

preparation and completion. Students will be given support with this through the

workshops

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: The Assessment Strategy has been designed to support and enhance the development of both subject-based and skills which will support progression onto the destination programme, whilst ensuring that the modules Learning Outcomes are attained, as described below.

Assessment 1 - Group work and reflective writing:

This assessment will provide students with an opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge on a broad range of topics through both a group work project and reflective writing. The assessment is designed for students to gain experience of key research and academic skills; including working collaboratively with peers, participating in research studies.

Students are in small groups (usually 4) and are expected to select from the outlined study sections to summarise, students will choose a study together and decide between them who works on which section.

Task 1: Within their group, each student is required to write a 300 word written research study summary.

Task 2: After signing up and participating in at least one study on the UWE Participant Pool (obtaining at least 1 credit) students will write a individual 300 word reflection on the experience.

This assessment will test a range of the learning outcomes and clear guidance on the weighting of different aspects of the assessment will be provided in the module handbook.

This assessment will be marked pass/fail and marks will be given on the basis of individual submissions and not a collective group mark.

Assessment 2 - Presentation:

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Students must individually present evidence of understanding related to the learning outcomes of this module. This is done through an in-class 10 minute (maximum) presentation, designed so students can demonstrate their understanding of the main theoretical perspectives within Psychology and its subdisciplines: Social, Biological, Cognitive, Developmental, Individual Differences.

By choosing a study to present on they will summarise, analyse and critique published psychological studies. This allows them to understand a range of methodological approaches to psychological research in a variety of scholarly formats. The requirements for the presentation will be clearly indicated to students through their module handbook at the beginning of the module, as well as through inclass explanations and support.
