Part 2: Description

Overview: The primary aim of this module is the exploration of the Criminal Justice System in England and Wales. This involves discussions of the philosophies that inform it, the institutions that comprise it, the individuals that engage in various ways with it, and the processes that are implicit within it.

Features: In this module, students will learn to appreciate the various agencies and processes involved in the criminal justice system in England and Wales and the debates that surround them.

Student and Academic Services

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Educational aims: The educational aims of this module are to build upon and

develop the skills learned within Level four modules of Society, Criminology and

Law.

The syllabus comprises an introduction to the mechanics of the criminal justice

system and the various influences upon it, with a particular focus on the key

institutions and key processes.

It is anticipated that students will reflect and recognise the systemic complexities

which are inherent in the criminal justice system and how it reflects societal and

political views on criminality learned in year one.

Students will develop the ability to be critical and draw comparisons to other models

and jurisdictions and to consider alternative models. In addition to being critical,

students will develop an awareness of political and cultural values.

Inclusivity and diversity are inherent to the module and the module aims to present

an environment where ideas on these issues are can be exchanged and respected.

It is anticipated that the module will present a fair balance between academic and

practice.
