Part 2: Description

Overview: Learners will study the advanced learning required to specialise as a response officer or in community policing. This module primarily focuses on decision making, analysing vulnerability and risk, issues of public protection, managing information and intelligence, effective investigations, and the advanced learning in either response or community policing.

Educational aims: To understand risk factors associated with vulnerability, and strategies to successfully investigate public protection incidents.

To develop effective, ethical investigation skills.

To enable learners to police effectively in challenging environments, employing approaches to promote community engagement.

Outline syllabus: This module will develop learners' key policing skills, building upon their knowledge gained during previous study and professional practice, enabling them to become advanced practitioners. The module aligns to the National Policing Curriculum (see Advanced Operational Practice appendix 1), with learners also completing one of the curriculum's five advanced learning areas.

Developing on learning in other modules, learners will undertake further study into the risk factors associated with vulnerability, tackling victimisation, and the management of repeat offenders. Learners will also explore the effect abuse has on victims, and strategies to achieve best-evidence in public protection investigations. The module will ensure learners challenge their own attitudes and behaviours, exploring the ways this can negatively impact investigations through bias. In doing so, learners will develop a deeper understanding of victimisation and the psychology of offending which will enable them to identify challenges that may need to be overcome during investigations.

The module will explore complex digitally-facilitated crime including fraud and sexual offending, regulatory structures, and key terms associated with such incidents.

Learners will critically evaluate decisions made during investigations, how to use lessons learned, recording decision-making appropriately. Learners will further explore the investigative interviewing of suspects and witnesses, using strategies appropriate to the often-complex needs of the individual and the investigation.

Intelligence and Information systems, relevant legislation, and the complexity of using intelligence in an operational context and during prosecutions will be explored,

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ensuring learners are able to act lawfully and ethically in their professional practice,

managing the risk to the public appropriately.

Learners will complete one of the five advanced learning curriculum areas to become

specialist response or community officers, analysing the way policing has been

affected by social and cultural change, developing strategies to police effectively in

challenging environments. Learners specialising in community policing will examine

the interventions that can promote community engagement, evaluating what works

using the evidence-base. Learners will explore how engagement strategies can be

implemented within operational constraints, ensuring that community policing

remains effective in the developing policing landscape.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: A variety of face-to-face and distance learning

methodologies will be employed, including lectures, seminars, case-studies, web-

based learning and independent study. Learners will be encouraged to use their

previous policing experiences to reflect on their approach to practice.

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: Assessment One:

Students will give an oral presentation based on a simulated case study. Learners will be given 15 minutes for the presentation, with 15 minutes for questions from assessors.

Rationale:

This assessment will ensure that learners are able to apply their knowledge and understanding of complex incidents. The assessment will encourage learners to be reflective practitioners, constantly striving to improve their practice. This assessment will link to professional practice as officers will be expected to discuss cases and community issues with senior and specialist colleagues.

Assessment Two:

2500 word case study examining either a community policing or response policing scenario. Learners will be required to create a strategy to resolve the issue.

Rationale:

This assignment will assess a learner's ability to evaluate the challenges in response policing, or to develop stronger community engagement, showing an awareness of evidence-based practice. Learners will be required to evidence the skills required in operational practice.

Formative activity will take place throughout the module through engagement with

cohort and group discussion, questioning and knowledge checks. Learners will build presentation skills through class discussion, group work and presentations.
