## Part 2: Description

This first-year module is taught over three terms and will introduce you to basic storytelling, a range of acting methodologies, techniques and theories and allow you to apply these techniques in several workshop-based text projects, drawing on a range of material from the theatre canon.

As part of the building of your 'Actor's Toolkit' you will cover rehearsal methods and techniques, character development, textual analysis, basic performance technique, improvisation and 'play'. You will be working towards a synthesis of all vocal/physical techniques in characterisation and communication through performance - live or recorded. You will also be given a basic introduction to on-camera and audio skills.

You will be introduced to the theories of Alexander Technique, Complicite, Improvisation and Theatre Clown and in the autumn term participate in a series of lectures and practical performances using texts from theatre history.

Students will have the opportunity to learn through group classes, tutorials, individual and group project work and rehearsals. Much of your learning will be in the form of in-class verbal feedback on your performance from your tutors.

You will be expected to engage in self-directed learning including essential reading, research preparation and presentation.

## Part 3: Assessment

# This is a Professional Practice module with only one component of assessment. This component has a number of elements of assessment and which overall are Pass/Fail.

#### Assessment Strategy

To pass this module you must successfully pass all of the elements listed below.

Assessment will be made of your basic understanding and competency in acting technique, methods and approaches at three phased assessment points (end of the autumn, spring and summer terms). Assessment will also be made of the application and creative use of acting technique in workshop text projects and a series of internal practice auditions. The observation of class-based work will enable the assessment of your ability to 'play' and to exercise the creative imagination through relaxation, concentration and ensemble appreciation.

Feedback of student progress is given by tutors and external text project directors throughout the Module. This will enable the identification of your ability to understand and interpret complex texts covering Ancient storytelling, Restoration theatre, Shakespeare and contemporary writers from diverse and international backgrounds.

The identification of specific actor learning techniques, where a 'toolkit' of techniques and methodologies are presented to you, will be assessed in class by tutors. The synthesis of those techniques will be applied to all text based, movement, singing and voice work within the school, thereby demonstrating a continuity of approach across all departments.

Formative feedback is provided by both tutors and directors at the end of the autumn, spring and summer terms as follows

- 1. Tutorial feedback
- 2. Written Assessment from Directors
- 3. Written assessment from tutors
- 4. Verbal assessment from tutors and directors following internal auditions and both during rehearsal and at the end of text project showings
