Part 2: Description

The module will examine fiction and poetry written in the period between 1900 and 1950. These texts will be approached in relation to their historical, cultural and literary contexts, in order to investigate the ways in which they are affected by (and contribute to) the discourses of the period in politics, culture, and the arts. The focus will be on how literary texts respond to modernity and related social and cultural change; how they articulate national identity; what role empire plays in the writing of the period; what the relationship is between literary modernism, realism and popular genre writing.

In light of the contextual approach to the literary texts, the module will make informed reference to non-literary cultural productions, historical events such as the two World Wars, the art and architecture of the period.

Part 3: Assessment

The assessment will consist of 3 elements:

Component A:

This will take the form of a 2-hour unseen exam which will enable students to engage with the contextual and conceptual aspects of the module with reference to the literary texts studied. Students will be asked to answer two questions, one from part 1 and one from part 2. Part 1 questions will focus on context, national identity, empire, and war; Part 2 questions will centre on form, genre, and literary contexts. Students will be able to showcase the

breadth of their understanding of the key elements of the module.

Component B:

(KIS)

Element 1 (1000-word critical analysis) will give students an opportunity to engage in close reading of a short passage from the texts studied in semester one and to supplement this with a discussion of a relevant critical essay from a selection digitised on Blackboard. Detailed understanding of both literary and critical materials is assessed.

Element 2 (2000-word essay) will enable students to demonstrate understanding of texts studied in semester two in their historical and cultural context. Students will be expected to deploy critical materials and to show their ability to use them effectively to construct a clear argument in answer to the question.

The questions for all elements will be devised with close reference to what is studied on the module, thus minimising the possibility of plagiarism.
