Part 2: Description

Overview: This module cover a range of contemporary British fiction, alongside relevant historical contexts. Themes of the module include theoretical areas such as postmodernity, hybridity, and social class, as well as aspects of literary culture such as prizes, publishing, and celebrity.

Outline syllabus: This module introduces you to a small number of contemporary British novels and situates them in relation to their historical and cultural context. We discuss these texts with the help of theories of postmodernity, narration, identity and hybridity, economics and class. The module asks you to reflect on the ways in which contemporary British fiction is defined by the literary culture that includes prizes, reading formats (such as e-books), booksellers, and celebrity authorship.

Part 4: Assessment

Assessment strategy: Strategy:

Assessment 1 (2000 word summative essay) enables students to demonstrate understanding of the literary texts studied on the module in their historical and cultural context. Students will show the ability to related texts to one another.

Assessments 2 and 3 serve a double purpose. Assessment 2 encourages students to deploy their ability to read a text critically, to develop an argument and supplement it with critical sources, and/or to situate a text in relation to the processes of prize-winning culture. Assessment 3 builds on the work done on literary culture and the literary market in the course of the module, while also giving students the opportunity to enhance their research skills and their understanding of design software.

The Assessment:

Assessment 1: 2000-word summative essay with a choice of theoretical and/or thematic questions (30% of the marks for the module);

Assessment 2: 2500-word written assignment, consisting either of a literary-critical essay using one of the set questions, or a "prize winning pack" that situates a chosen text in relation to literary culture using a range of short pieces (35% of the marks for the module);

Assessment 3: 1000-word book review with 1000 word annotated bibliography, which allows students to choose one text from semester two and engage with it in ways not covered by a conventional literary-critical essay, whilst also showing the research undertaken for the task in the accompanying annotated bibliography (35% of the marks for the module).

Since the module requires student to respond directly to the ideas of the module in a

sustained way across a range of different tasks, it would be difficult for students to plagiarise without detection.
