Part 2: Description

This module introduces you to a small number of contemporary British novels and situates them in relation to their historical and cultural context. We discuss these texts with the help of theories of postmodernity, narration, identity and hybridity, economics and class. The module asks you to reflect on the ways in which contemporary British fiction is defined by the literary culture that includes prizes, reading formats (such as e-books), booksellers, and celebrity authorship.

Part 3: Assessment: Strategy and Details

Strategy:

• COMPONENT A enables students to demonstrate understanding of the literary texts studied on the module in their historical and cultural context. Students will show the ability to related texts to one another.

- COMPONENT B serves a double purpose. Element 1 (literary-critical essay) encourages students to deploy their ability to read a text critically, to develop an argument and supplement it with critical sources, and to engage with a particular aspect of the module related to one of the literary texts studied. Element 2 builds on the work done on literary culture and the literary market in the course of the module, while also giving students the opportunity to enhance their research skills and enterprise skills.
- Students may wish to consult the <u>university word count policy</u>.

The Assessment:

- Component A: 1-hour useen examination. The exam will ask students to answer ONE broad conceptual
 or contextual question with reference to two texts studied on the module. (30% of the marks for the
 module)
- Component B: Element one, the 3,000-word literary-critical essay, will have one question for each of the texts studied in semester one (35% of the marks for the module); element 2 (35% of the marks for the module) gives students a choice of TWO options: (a) the 1000-word book review with 1000-word annotated bibliography allows students to choose one text from semester two and engage with it in ways not covered by a conventional literary-critical essay, whilst also showing the research undertaken for the task in the accompanying annotated bibliography; (b) the 1500-word market report and analysis allows students to work to a brief centred on developing their understanding of literature in the marketplace.
