Educational aims: The module seeks to develop an understanding of international humanitarian law in practice and theory. The module takes a practical approach to the subject by using contemporary concrete examples as well as problem-solving

questions as international humanitarian law is more likely to be applied in the field rather than discussed at length in academic circles.

In addition to the Learning Outcomes, the module may explore, develop and practice the ability to work in groups.

Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

Teaching and learning methods: The main focus of teaching and learning on the taught LLM programme is through independent research and debate in the context of 2 hour weekly workshops. The workshop-based approach to teaching and learning is designed to enable the student to develop the independent research, analytical and reflective skills required for successful completion of a postgraduate level course. Students will need to complete the necessary preparatory reading and study of any set case materials in advance of each workshop. From each workshop, the student will be expected to have developed a general mastery of the subject under consideration. In addition, students will be expected to raise, critically assess and defend different points of view on controversial issues in class and to make presentations to the class on their own and in groups.

Part 4: Assessment

written assignment. Thus it seems to make sense to have one single assignment.

To undertake short, focused research (as the examination is open book).

To be assessed on all areas discussed in the workshops.

In the workshops students will be given many opportunities to practice problemquestions. The first scenarios of the problem-question will be simple but will increasingly become more complex as we progress in the term. This will enable

students to acquire the necessary skills to answer such questions.

Learning outcomes will be assessed by the examination. Assessment questions will be set by tutors. The assessment requires students to undertake independent

research building on material covered in the workshop sessions.
