**Educational aims:** This module is designed to provide students with detailed knowledge and understanding of the principles of supportive and end of life care and how societal attitudes to death and dying may impact on the provision of that care. It

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also seeks to equip students with an awareness of wide a variety of issues within the context of end of life care.

**Outline syllabus:** The programme will include:

Contextual Issues to include: societal attitudes to death, dying and end of life care. Policy directives and government guidance

Holistic assessment and personalised care and management of pain and common symptoms.

Holistic and personalised assessment of emotional, social and spiritual needs of individuals and their families and carers to include: Impact of life limiting and life-threatening illness, responding to loss and change including grief and bereavement, issues related body image, sexuality and spiritual and religious needs.

The challenges and benefits of communication to include: skills to support open and honest communication, responding to emotional distress and sharing significant news.

Ethical and Professional Issues to include: application of ethical principles and decision making in supportive end of life care. Working with diversity and difference and multi-professional working in health and social care.
