Demonstrate and evidence cross-cultural awareness and understanding i.e. to be able adapt to living and studying in a different cultural context and to interact effectively with those from a different culture or cultrual background Contextualise their understanding of world and business events, and their response to situations, in a broader frame of reference. Demonstrate the development of specific academic and workplace competencies including problem solving, planning and organising, relationship building, networking, resilience, adaptability and flexibility Reflect on the experience of living and studying abroad and to be able to express the experience in such a way as to enhance their employability and future career prospects i.e. to utilise the SYA experience to develop a stronger graduate employment profile Syllabus Outline This is a not a taught module as such although completion of the SYA module requires students to satisfactorily complete the equivalent of a full year of study at a host institution. Whilst overseas on their chosen programme of study, students are expected to choose modules in their overseas institution equivalent to a full-time programme of study (28-30 ECTS credits per semester). The specific syllabus a student undertakes as part of their study year abroad will vary by country of study, institution attended and the specific interests and career aspirations of the student themselves. Students must have attempted all assessments as agreed in their Learning Agreement. In addition to the above students must complete the specific assessment tasks of this module and are supported through this process by the Module Leader. Contact Hours On the chosen programme of study at the partner overseas institution students are expected to conform to the requirements for assessment, attendance at scheduled classes and independent study for each module on which they are enrolled and for the institution that they are attending. Prior to departure students attend briefing sessions organised by the university's Study Abroad team studyabroad@uwe.ac.uk, (see UWE http://www1.uwe.ac.uk/whatcanistudy/studyabroad/goingabroadwitherasmus/howtoap ply.aspx) and with the Module Leader to ensure that students are fully supported through the process of choosing their destination, applying to their chosen destination and gaining an understanding of the local environment before departure. Once at the overseas institution the Module Leader is available to support students through the process of settling in and with the completion of the portfolio of summative assessment. This is achieved through regular contact via Blackboard and e-mail. Teaching and The specific teaching and learning methods of the SYA will be vary according to the Learning choice of modules and the institution attended. Methods In addition to the above all students complete an individual portfolio throughout the year which requires them to reflect on their personal development in relation to cross cultural awareness and skills and their knowledge of the country in which they are living and studying. Detailed guidelines on assessment requirements for the SYA module are issued at the start of each of the module. Guidance is included on the evidence gathering and other learning activities to be undertaken by students, and the tasks to be assessed in the portfolio. Scheduled learning is in pre departure briefings and weekly surgery hours during the Study Year Abroad made available synchronously via Blackboard. Independent learning forms the core of the module and centres on hours engaged with essential reading and preparation of the portfolio preparation and completion. **Key Information** Key Information Sets (KIS) are produced at programme level for all programmes that **Sets Information** this module contributes to, which is a requirement set by HESA/HEFCE.
