The notion of sustainable development occupies an important place in this module and provides an acknowledgement that environmental law needs to be considered at the same time as social and economic aspects of development. The module examines the north-south tension along with the link between trade, human rights and the environment. The module fits within the overall aims of all the LLM awards and has been designed in particular to address the need for internationalisation of the curriculum.
