The Reagan era 'wars' against drugs and organized crime

Transnational crime and policing

## Part 3: Teaching and learning methods

**Teaching and learning methods:** The module will be taught through a combination of lectures, seminars and tutor-directed learning tasks. Students are expected to make formal seminar presentations and will get immediate feedback.

Lectures: to introduce contextual framework and different interpretations of organized crime.

Seminars: to provide students with an opportunity to take an active part in determining their learning and to share ideas and insights with others.

Assessment of seminars to provide immediate guidance on the presentational skills of students and on the structure and content of their arguments.

Tutor-Directed Learning Tasks to ensure that every student in the group will be able to make a contribution to the discussions.

Students are expected to spend 10 hrs per week on the above learning activities.

Lectures, Seminars and Tutor-Directed Learning Tasks. There will be 3 contact hours per week. 1hr lecture, 1hr seminar, 1hr Tutor-Directed Learning Tasks.
