Part 2: Description

Educational Aims: In addition to the learning outcomes, the educational experience may explore, develop, and practise but not formally discretely assess the following:

Working as a team member, as part of the larger groups and as part of smaller sub-groups.

Working for the team by, for example, summarizing relevant journal or other specialist material as part of the tutor-directed learning tasks.

Outline Syllabus: The course starts with an introduction to theories and interpretations of organized crime and then examines relevant themes and events including:

Reconstruction and white supremacy, 1865-1900

Late 19th century industrialists: pioneers or plunderers?

Progressivism and the search for order, 1900-1920

Prohibition era crime, 1920-1933

A New Deal for crime?

White collar criminality

Theories of conspiracy, 1945-1970

Richard Nixon and the politics of crime, 1968-1975

The Reagan era 'wars' against drugs and organized crime

Transnational crime and policing

Teaching and Learning Methods: The module will be taught through a combination of lectures, seminars and tutor-directed learning tasks. Students are expected to make formal seminar presentations and will get immediate feedback.

Lectures: to introduce contextual framework and different interpretations of organized crime.

Seminars: to provide students with an opportunity to take an active part in determining their learning and to share ideas and insights with others.

Assessment of seminars to provide immediate guidance on the presentational skills of students and on the structure and content of their arguments.

Tutor-Directed Learning Tasks to ensure that every student in the group will be able to make a contribution to the discussions.

Students are expected to spend 10 hrs per week on the above learning activities.

Lectures, Seminars and Tutor-Directed Learning Tasks. There will be 3 contact hours per week. 1hr lecture, 1hr seminar, 1hr Tutor-Directed Learning Tasks.
