#### Part 2: Description

Educational Aims: See Learning Outcomes

**Outline Syllabus:** The emphasis throughout will be on providing the student the opportunity and facilities to question, understand, describe and evaluate the law in its historical, practical, academic and social context. The learning context is student-centred and utilizes a variety of techniques to encourage independent thought and constructive criticism. Dialogue is promoted between student and lecturer in an inter-active relationship which emphasizes the two-way flow of information and criticism.

It is not envisaged that every topic in the syllabus will always be covered in any one academic year. Areas that have topical significance could, therefore, be developed at greater length and less important areas delineated in outline only.

**Teaching and Learning Methods:** Teaching will be delivered using the 1+1+1 model, with 1 hour asynchronous lecture, 1 hour asynchronous seminar & 1 hour synchronous seminar per week, the latter on campus in due course.

The assessment strategy is designed to substantively determine the knowledge and understanding of students across the CAAL syllabus.

Component B assesses students' theoretical understanding of constitutional principles through a written essay, implementing the skills built throughout their first term. MCQs are designed to further refine that knowledge and direct students' focus.

Component A has a similar approach, except this time the extended problem solving assessment is aimed at administrative legal principles and focusing on the students' practical understanding of the subject.
