Learning Outcomes	 At the end of the module students will be able to demonstrate: An understanding of the techniques required to write plays (assessed in component A). An awareness of genres of drama explored in the module through the analysis of published texts (assessed in component A). The ability to write imaginatively and originally (assessed in component A). Skills in constructive criticism and creative editing (assessed in component A). 		
Syllabus Outline	Tutors will also encourage students to develop original ideas into stage plays by using existing dramatic works to provide an understanding of good structure and style. Practical exercises will be used in class to explore the creative writing process.		
Contact Hours/Scheduled Hours	The module will be delivered through three contact hours per week. The module will operate through a combination of seminars, lectures, workshop/practical exercises and self-directed groups according to the nature of the material being		

	studied.					
Teaching and Learning Methods	Scheduled Learning There will be weekly taught sessions where written contributions and participation from students is required. We will focus on discussing published works to understand their appeal in performance, and students will engage in creative writing exercises inspired by these texts that build towards a Workbook. Students will take part in readings of their own work as well as that of others from the group to establish the performability of the writing. Students will evaluate their own and their peers work in the safe environment of classroom discussions. Independent Learning Students will be expected to keep notes that will include their own reflections on and evaluation of the workshop. In addition, students will create a formative Workbook of dramatic writing, and a summative Portfolio containing the complete short play, which they will submit for evaluation.

Assessment Strategy	This is a project Module and therefore has only one component of assessment.			
	It is made up of three assessed elements:			
	Critical engagement with practice in classes. Critical Engagement is a student's preparedness for and participation in class-related learning activities. The preparations include rehearsal, primary and critical reading of a variety of texts (printed, online, screen media etc.), ongoing project work, writing exercises, and the generation of works-in-progress (10%).			
	A formative workbook of dramatic writing that are responses to class exercises and readings (30%).			
	A portfolio of dramatic writing that includes a complete short play and an introductory rationale. The portfolio word count is 3000 words (60%).			
	All assessments are given individual marks.			
	The assessment criteria for each element are available to students in electronic handbooks and via Blackboard at the beginning of the academic year. The criteria are module specific and aligned with the learning outcomes for the module.			
	Feedback is given in written form according to these criteria.
