	Critical engagement with practice in classes. Critical Engagement is a student's preparedness for and participation in class-related learning activities. The preparations include rehearsal, primary and critical reading of variety of texts (printed, online, screen media etc.), ongoing project work, writing exercises, and the generation of works-in-progress (10%).  A research presentation of 7 minutes, accompanied by an annotated bibliography (40%).  Component B: Essay (4000 words) (50%).  All assessments are given individual marks.  The assessment criteria for each element are available to students in electronic handbooks and via Blackboard at the beginning of the academic year. The criteria are module specific and aligned with the learning outcom for the module.  Feedback is given in written form according to these criteria.
