Teaching and Learning Methods	Students will engage with the module leader to establish clear aims and objectives for this module which will be programme relevant. Participants will be allocated a tutor to guide and support them in their independent learning. The learning approaches will be negotiated between the student and the supporting tutor. Contact time of 36 hours will be divided through a combination of lectures, seminars and practical sessions. It is expected that students will spend a minimum of 114 hours on independent learning as this is an essential component of modules at undergraduate level. Students will not be able to complete the module successfully without undertaking the required amount of independent learning. This independent learning will include a combination of lone study and individual, pair and group work. The virtual learning environment (VLE), email and phone calls will be used to keep in touch with students between scheduled sessions. Scheduled Learning May include lectures, seminars, tutorials, demonstration, practical classes and workshops, external visits. Independent Learning May include hours engaged with essential reading, assignment preparation and completion etc. These sessions constitute an average time per level as indicated in the table below. Scheduled sessions may vary slightly depending on the module choices you make.
