Learning Outcomes	<p>Upon successful completion of this module students will be able to :</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Produce a substantial piece of curatorial practice that evidences innovation and originality (component A) 2. Work collaboratively and effectively with cultural organisations (component A) 3. Reflect on, and respond to difficulties and challenges faced in the curatorial process (component A) 4. Demonstrate an understanding of the state of the art in their particular field and ability to engage with current issues through practice (component A) 5. Demonstrate a thorough understanding of the regulatory and policy framework for contemporary cultural institutions (component A) 6. Critically reflect on and analyse contemporary curatorial practices in written form and according to academic standards (component A)
Syllabus Outline	<p>This module involves the production of and reflection on a major piece of curatorial work in collaboration with a partner institution. Differing schedules of partner institutions may mean that the work is produced at the beginning or the end of the semester, so that the balance of production / reflection may vary from student to student. Students are supported by academic and partner mentors but are expected to work independently. In addition, students document their on going practice and reflections.</p>
Contact Hours	<p>Students' contact hours will vary according to need, but they are expected to have regular</p>

	contact and supervisory meetings with both academic and partner mentors.
Teaching and Learning Methods	<p>This module requires students to work independently. There is regular one-to-one tutorial contact, but students also have the opportunity to share experiences and provide peer support through online and face-to-face group meetings. Readings will be recommended individually by tutors, or researched independently by the student</p> <p>Scheduled learning includes one-to-one tutorials and group meetings during which students report and reflect on progress and offer peer support, plus one group meeting at the end of the module, where students present their work.</p> <p>Independent learning includes hours engaged with reading, researching and undertaking the project.</p>
Reading Strategy	<p>All students will be encouraged to make full use of the print and electronic resources available to them and through systems such as UWE online.</p> <p>Any essential reading is available in the Bower Ashton Library and will be indicated clearly in the module brief. The currency of information may wane during the life span of the specification, consequently current advice on readings will be available through more frequently updated mechanisms such as the handbook and intranet, these will be revised annually.</p> <p>Under the university's Copyright Licensing Agency (CLA) permit, reading packs with relevant chapters or excerpts from books will be given to students where applicable, supplied at the beginning of the module. Text excerpts from books published in the UK may also be available via UWE Online Digital Collections, where permissible, during the module period.</p>
Indicative Reading List	<p>Indicative Reading List: Reading will be agreed between student and tutor as appropriate to the student's specific project, and a bibliography will be drawn up by the student as part of their on-going practice.</p>
