## Part 2: Description

The aim of the module is to introduce students to professional and technical forms of writing alongside a range of literary figures whose political, economic and environmental concerns have shaped cultural debates through various forms including speeches, letters, essays and blogs.

The module will be delivered through four thematic blocks which may focus on Social and Digital Media; Oration and Speech writing; Creative Non-fiction and Commercial writing.

Throughout the module students will be given opportunities, in assessment, to reflect on relevant experience in fields such as copywriting, marketing and reviewing. UWE Careers staff will provide career talks and guidance sessions throughout the module. The students will receive technical training in tools such as Adobe Desktop Publishing that will help them to produce professional pieces of work.

In the second semester students will be introduced to relevant professional codes of practice to develop their understanding of the ethics involved in professional writing careers. Throughout the module industry experts will both deliver a series of talks to students and provide formative feedback to students

### Part 3: Assessment: Strategy and Details

#### Component A

1) Students will write and deliver a short polemical speech on a theme covered during the first 12 weeks of the module.

#### Component B

- 1) This assignment will require students to set up and write a blog during the first seven weeks of the module. They will submit a critical commentary in which they will critically reflect on issues such as design, the writing process, audience and reception.
- 2) The Portfolio tests students' professional writing skills and their understanding of diverse forms such as commercial writing and writing for digital media. It will consist of four elements which may include: a) cultural biography b) a critical review; c) a piece of travel writing; d) a letter, e) a memoir f) a creative writing piece.
